Who is PCBN?

The Peel Community Benefits Network (PCBN) is an initiative of the Peel Poverty Reduction Strategy Committee (PPRSC), which is co-chaired by the Region of Peel and United Way Greater Toronto.

PCBN was established as a Community Benefits Agreement (CBA) as a strategic tool to build community wealth.




What is a Community Benefits Agreement?

A CBA is a negotiated agreement that brings together community-based groups and a private or public development agent.

PCBN partners include community organizations, labour organizations, local boards of trade and municipal and provincial government partners.



History of Community Benefits in Ontario





PCBN envisions Peel as an inclusive, thriving region in which all residents have equitable opportunities to contribute to building healthy communities and a prospering economy.

PCBN Goals

Accessible transit: The construction and operation of the Hurontario LRT will create accessible transit in the Peel region, which is critical for the community's social, environmental and economic well-being.

> Job opportunities: Expansion of transit infrastructure will result in opportunities for good jobs in construction and operations.


> > Economic inclusion: A Community Benefits Agreement will ensure that the diversity of the workers on the LRT project reflects the diversity of the residents of Peel.

- Enact targeted hiring and recruitments, as well as wage levels and work conditions.


Procurement Systems

Coordinate employment pathways for PAT Jobs, Apprenticeships, & Social Procurement in line with Community Benefits targets





According to the <u>Ontario Government</u>, "skilled trades workers build and maintain infrastructures like our homes, schools, hospitals, roads, farms and parks. They keep industries running and perform many services we rely on every day."





Learn More About the Skilled Trades

- Apprenticeship guide
 - <u>Building Up's Pre-Apprenticeship</u> program: 16-week paid training
 - <u>Tomorrow's Trades</u>: 12-week experiential learning program
 - Starting an Apprenticeship
 - Explore the skilled trades
 - Eligibility:
 - At least 16 years of age and legally entitled to work in Canada
 - Youth in grade 11 or 12Youth in, or about to sta
 - rt postsecondary education
 - Youth or adult who has graduated or left high school, or starting a second career
 - Complete pre-apprenticeship training, which includes safety training and in-class sessions
 - Find an employer or sponsor.
 - Finish an Apprenticeship
 - Get your Certificate of Apprenticeship
 - Arrange your exam (determined by trade)
 - Get your Certificate of Qualification
 - Earn a <u>Red Seal</u> to work in other provinces and territories
 - <u>Trade Equivalency Assessment</u> for experienced workers
